Maj. Gen. Timothy J. Lowenberg

We are pleased to welcome Gen. Tim Lowenberg, the Adjutant General of the State of Washington, to Seattle University School of Law and *National Security Law*.

Class begins at 12:00pm and Guests (including non law students who are guests of students in space available) are welcome to join us at 1:00pm. In addition to his roles as Homeland Security Advisor to Gov. Gregoire, MGen. Lowenberg will lecture on the role of the military in responding to national security threats, balancing constitutional and civil rights in times of crisis, and the important role of the Air and National Guards in state and national emergencies.

Background: Major General Timothy J. Lowenberg was appointed as the adjutant general of Washington on 13 September 1999. As the adjutant general, he guides the preparation of Washington Army and Air National Guard citizen soldiers and airmen to respond in times of state or national emergency. He is responsible for Federal and State missions, assignment of leaders, recruiting, training, equipping, mobilization, facilities, and public relations. He is also responsible for formulating, developing, and coordinating all policies, plans, and programs affecting the Army National Guard and the Air National Guard members in Washington. General Lowenberg also serves as

chairman of the Homeland Security Committee for the Adjutants General Association of the United States and as Homeland Security Advisor to the Governor.

General Lowenberg is a distinguished graduate of the Air Force Reserve Officer Training Corps (ROTC). He received his commission in 1968 concurrent with a bachelor of arts degree in political science from the University of Iowa. He earned a doctor of jurisprudence degree from the University of Iowa College of Law in 1971.

As the Air National Guard Assistant to The Judge Advocate General, General Lowenberg oversaw formulation, development, and coordination of legal policies, plans and programs affecting more than 114,000 Air Guard members in more than 1,100 units throughout all 50 States, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, Guam and the Virgin Islands. In addition, he coordinated the accession, training, and deployment of all Air Guard judge advocates and paralegals and was responsible for developing and executing the worldwide civil affairs (nation-building) mission of the U.S. Air Force
