PRESENTERS

Steve Eckstrom manages the Victim Services Program of the Washington State Department of Corrections. The program provides notification to victims when offenders release from prison, facilitates victim input in offender release planning, and coordinates collaborative safety planning for victims of high-risk offenders. The program also administers the Department's Victim Offender Meeting policy. Steve has worked in victim services in the state of Washington since 1980.

Eric B. Gilman is the Restorative Justice Coordinator and Community Programs Supervisor for the Clark County Juvenile Court (Washington). In his role as RJ Coordinator Eric provides coordination for the juvenile court management team's ongoing development and implementation of a holistic Balanced & Restorative Justice foundation for the work of the court. This endeavor has resulted in a number of highly successful programs and innovative practices. As Community Programs Supervisor, Eric is responsible for the department's Victim Impact Program, Restorative Community Service Program, and its Diversion Program, which includes Community Accountability Boards.

Susan Sharpe, Ph.D. has worked independently in the restorative justice field since the mid-1990's, writing and consulting for community programs, government departments, and international NGOs on a range of projects in Canada, the US, and South Africa. The author of *Restorative Justice: A Vision for Healing and Change*, she is Adjunct Professor with the Dept of Criminology at Simon Fraser University and a former board member with the Victim Offender Mediation Association.

Nadine Wettstein is the Director of the Legal Action Center (LAC) of the American Immigration Law Foundation in Washington DC. AILF's LAC conducts impact litigation; writes amicus curiae briefs to federal courts and administrative agencies; conducts the Litigation Institute; participates in other legal education programs; writes Practice Advisories on a wide variety of current topics, and, through the Litigation Clearinghouse, publicizes information about immigrants' rights litigation and work across the country. Nadine Wettstein has litigated cases at the Board of Immigration Appeals and in various federal courts and the U.S. Supreme Court. Her career has focused on immigration law for more than 20 years.

Robert Pauw is a partner in the Seattle law firm of *Gibbs Houston Pauw* and teaches immigration law at Seattle University School of Law. He is a 1983 graduate of Harvard Law School and is one of the founding members of the Northwest Immigrant Rights Project in Seattle. He specializes in immigration related litigation, and has been counsel for plaintiffs in several significant immigration cases. Mr. Pauw currently serves on the Board of Trustees for the American Immigration Law Foundation (AILF), and has served on the Board of Governors as well as on several other committees for the American Immigration Lawyers Association (AILA). Robert received the Jack Wasserman Award for excellence in litigation in June of 1999.

Won Kidane is an Assistant Professor of Law at the Seattle University School of Law. He teaches and writes in the areas of immigration law, administrative law, and international and comparative law. Before joining the Seattle University Law School, Professor Kidane taught at the Penn State Dickinson School of Law for three years. The courses he taught include immigration law, administrative law, and a clinical course in immigration and refugee law. Professor Kidane has worked as a legal officer in association with the African regional office of the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR). His duties included refugee status determination, and the protection of rights of refugees. In that capacity, he travelled to and worked in various refugee camps in East Africa. At about the same period, he also taught criminal procedure and law of evidence as an adjunct in Addis Ababa.
