CURRENT RESEARCH AGENDA

Cognitive Camera Technologies: Human Identity and the Dire Constitutional Implications of Cognitive Forensic Mapping. Designed to produce a series of four articles, this project evaluates the constitutional significance of new technologies that build on advances in neuroscience and the study of cognitive strategies to probe the contents of one's mind. This technique may be employed to collect a variety of types of information that then is offered as evidence in criminal prosecutions, and it appears that the judiciary is not yet sufficiently aware of either the personal or the constitutional implications to exclude such evidence from the trial or discourage its initial collection. This project proposes, in series, an analysis under the Fourth, Fifth and Fourteenth Amendments which synthesizes a proposed theoretical interpretive framework with the existing landscape of law.

In Physics as in Law: Toward a Grand Unified Theory of the First Amendment. I propose a model of the First Amendment which allows the

various separate provisions to be understood as forming a single coordinated instrument for manifesting a particular vision of human intellectual freedom. Taking the religion clauses as an example, this article explores how the theory would resolve certain doctrinal tensions in the context of institutional use of religious messaging or programming.

Jesus Lives in Jail – The Rise and Role of Faith in Correctional Institutions.

This project seeks to understand both the stimuli for and means of developing or deepening religious commitment among incarcerated individuals. The inquiry will include a review of current legal treatment of religious matters in prison settings, and outline several problematic aspects of the relationship between penal law and private religion that have yet to be reconciled by the court system.

A New Renaissance: Rethinking a Hyper-Rational Order. This work explores the intellectual and cultural underpinnings of Western legal thought and tracking our progress towards the assumed ideals. The article will ask how our society would be different without an emphasis on dichotomous relationships and a separation of the rational from the intuitive mind.
